We are writing today, as the Voice of the Nova Scotia tourism industry, to support the formal designation of two candidate locations to Nova Scotia's Protected Areas Network.

A healthy tourism industry is integrally linked with a healthy environment. Adventure tourism and recreational tourism are the fastest growing sectors of the broad tourism economy, which generated \$2.64 billion in the province in 2019. The proposed Ingram River and Archibald Lake Wilderness Areas each hold unique and relevant environmental and recreational values, positioning them as appropriate candidates for formal protection.





In addition to providing important wildlife habitat for animals including the endangered mainland moose, Archibald Lake has a strong history of being used for recreational tourism activities. During the provincial consultations in 2020, camping, fishing, paddling, and wilderness hiking were all documented in the area. There is also potential to strengthen and support the work being carried on by Historic Sherbrooke Village and the proposed Beluga Whale Sanctuary at Port Hilford. TIANS also urges the formal protection of this area to mitigate the environmental risk associated with the proposed gold mine expansion on adjacent lands.

The Ingram River Candidate Wilderness Area has been recognized by the Nova Scotia Crown Share Land Legacy Trust and Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society for its significant old growth forests, including some of the oldest trees in the Maritimes, as well as being home for numerous species at risk. The area is ideally situated for a proposed Bay-to-Bay trail which would run from Windsor to St.Margaret's Bay, providing eco-tourism activity opportunities and generating associated economic impact.

As we begin the rebuild of Nova Scotia's economy post pandemic, places such as Ingram River and Archibald Lake Wilderness Areas will play a valuable role around inciting travel for residents and visitors alike.

Thank you for your work to ensure a sustainable future for Nova Scotia. We look forward to the formal designation of these areas.
